It is true that outside of the tournament season, sumo practice sessions can run for several hours.

There is of course no obligation to be there at the very start. However, it is considered polite not to leave during the course of the training session. Thus, if you don't want to stay for hours, my advice is to join the training session half-way through. Of course, during Tokyo tournament time, practice sessions are much shorter (rarely more than 2.5 hours), so this may be more ideal for you. The next Tokyo tournament is of course in January.

As for recommended stables,

Musashigawa and Michinoku spring to mind, as they are used to receiving first-time visitors regularly.

Michinoku is located just opposite the Kokugikan, behind the Chanko Kirishima restaurant. Musashigawa is in the backstreets of Uguisudani and can be reached via the JR station of the same name. As far as I am aware, both stables have websites with telephone numbers included, should you wish to call ahead.
